Brothers,



From the Chaplain's Desk: VOCATION AWARENESS WEEK

Greetings my brother Knights,

The month of November has many important moments for us as a nation: Election Tuesday (this year for president), Veterans Day on November 11 and Thanksgiving Day (this year on Thursday, November 28). All of these are moments for us to celebrate and exercise our duties as citizens of this country. We have received so many blessings and graces in the USA. We need to show our gratitude for all of this by being active in our duties as citizens and making sure we help to make our country a true nation of goodness and justice.

Of course, we are primarily "citizens of heaven" as St. Paul reminds us (Philippians 3:20-21). This means that we also must be active in our duties in this citizenship as well and we do this mostly by answering God's call to be who he has created us to be, our vocation. Most of the "citizens of heaven" are called to the vocation of marriage, as are most of you brother Knights. The more you live out your vocation in faith, hope and charity, the greater will be your citizenship and the more God's kingdom will come on earth. It is also true that some citizens of heaven are called to a life of special consecration as sisters, brothers, priests and deacons. With this in mind, the Church in the United States as set aside the first week of November each year pray for vocations to the consecrated life and to increase awareness of this possibility among our youth. This is how our bishops describe this week:

National Vocation Awareness Week, celebrated November 3-9, 2024, is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promoting vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations.

Therefore, our duty as "citizens of heaven" this week of November is to pray, educate and support vocations to the consecrated life. How best to do this? One way is to take advantage of our Vocation Cross Program and volunteer to take the vocation cross into our home for a week and pray for vocations. As Knights, we already support those from our parish who are pursuing a vocation to the consecrated life through the RSVP (Refund Support Vocations Programs) and that is awesome. Maybe there is more we can do in the way of educating. One resource might be the Cor program. The K of C website states:

Cor exists to form and strengthen Catholic men in faith and virtue as missionary disciples by drawing them into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ through prayer, formation, and fraternity.

If my relationship with Jesus deepens, I will necessarily be in a better place to pray for and support vocations and also educate young people on how best to discern their vocation. I encourage us as a council to consider beginning this program as a way to increase our work for vocations in our parish and in the Church at large.

A Word from Our Worthy Fraternal Insurance Agent *Dave Moeller*

Brother Knights,

November is National Long-Term Care Awareness Month, an event recognized by the US legislature as a very important way to raise awareness about elder care and planning before it's needed. To mark the occasion, here are 10 critical facts shared by the American Association for Long-Term Care Insurance:

1 - Americans are living longer, in large part due to advances in medical care and public health. Life expectancy in the US for those reaching 65 was an additional 20 years on average in 2019.

2 - By 2030, one in five residents in the US will be age 65 or older.

#3 – The number of people in need of long-term support services (LTSS) in the United States is already at 14 million and expected to grow to 27 million by 2050.

#4 – Average out-of-pocket costs are \$140,000 for those individuals who utilize paid long term support services (LTSS). Roughly 17 percent will spend over \$100,000 on LTSS. Almost 9 percent will spend over \$250,000 on LTSS. # 5 – By 2040, the total prevalence of Alzheimer's disease and related dementias in the US is expected to approximately double from 7.2 million to nearly 13 million, with 8.5 million women and 4.5 million men expected to develop dementia.

6 – For those requiring high levels of LTSS, individuals and families pay 55 percent of long-term care costs out of pocket.

#7 – Currently, most older single-person households are female. Women comprised 74 percent of solo households age 80 and over.

#8-Some 7.5 million Americans have some form of long-term care insurance. Two-thirds of all new individual long-term care insurance claims pay for care needed by women.

#9 – The long-term care insurance industry paid out \$11 billion in benefits to some 310,000 individuals with insurance protection in 2019. The number will increase each year as the current number of policyholders grow older and, as a result, are more likely to begin their claim.

10 – 69.5 percent of new claims start after the policyholder reached age 80. If you live a long life, you are very likely going to need long term care. You'll be very glad you have a policy to pay benefits.

These facts are sobering, and you can see why longterm care support is a significant retirement savings "buster". Your Knights of Columbus benefits includes the solution to this issue in the form of Long-term Care insurance available to both you and your spouse. Please contact me for more details.
